Local Artwork by Daniel Stewart & Tom Poole Featured at City Hall

Revelstoke, B.C – The City of Revelstoke now proudly displays work by local artists Daniel Stewart and Tom Poole.

In August 2024, the City called out to residents for artwork. The Public Art Committee members deliberated over several submissions, but 'Albert Peaks' and 'Sunset Cloud Inversion' stood out for being easily recognizable, and the Committee thought they'd resonate with locals and visitors. The pieces will be exhibited for one year, with a second call-out expected later in 2025.

Carol Palladino, Committee Chair, states, "The Public Art Committee is very pleased to showcase our local artists in a couple of very high traffic areas at City Hall. The high quality work speaks volumes in regard to the amazing talent we have in our mountain town".

Photographer Daniel Stewart (Albert Peaks) comments, "I'm excited to show a piece that was a part of my solo exhibition 'InfraRad' from 2023 at the Revelstoke Visual Arts Centre. It is a photo I took of Mount Albert and its many peaks with my infrared-converted digital camera. The chlorophyll from the foliage in the photo reflects infrared light, which, in turn, shows up as the deep red that you see in the print. Thank you to the City of Revelstoke for providing this opportunity to show my work in such a wonderful way!"

Tom Poole (Sunset Cloud Inversion) reflects, "Revelstoke's landscapes have a way of making you pause, breathe, and appreciate the beauty of nature. This photograph is a reminder of those quiet moments above the clouds, where the world feels still, and the mountains stand timeless. Going out to shoot sunsets is what I call 'Chasing the Dragon'. Sunsets are unpredictable, unique and constantly changing, the pursuit of capturing the 'ultimate sunset' can become an obsession for photographers, which more times than often don't go the way you hope, but its moments like these, where braving the cold and staying out late to capture the changing light, makes it all worth it" adding that he is "grateful to share this image from a place that resonates with himself and so many others."

The City is excited to share the works of two talented local artists and looks forward to continuing this process annually.
